Bill Peters was the first winner of the trophy in 1947 and was followed by Bob Hughes. Paul Held became the first athlete to win the award two consecutive years when he accomplished it in 1949 and 1950.

Bill Dornblaser followed the trend by winning the honor for the next two years. He was followed by Al Herring, 1954; and Bob Weiss, 1955. George Allen and Jerry Nicholson became the first co-winners at last year's event.

The public is invited to attend the banquet, which also will feature spring sports participants. Tickets for the dinner are priced at \$1.75 and are available in the student store.

HIGH SCORING SPARKS PLAY


Once again high scoring played the key role in weekend games of the Blue Streak Six-Pitch and Industrial Softball Leagues.

ROD & GUN Chatter

Yellowtail fishing to the south of us at the Coronado Islands considered slow by most with 485 decked Saturday and 649 Sunday. Actually, last year that would have been considered really hot with every one breaking their necks to board their favorite craft out of the Point Loma landings.

This season, however, start-out with anywhere from one to two thousand scrappy yellows checked-in daily, has continued with only an occasional dip below the 1000 mark.

Anyway, the recent break to high gear again Monday down didn't last long; went into high gear again Monday with a dock total of 1112. First period in the San Diego Yellowtail Derby ends this week end with qualifying weight nearing 23½ pounds. Second period takes up the 28th, with the fish-off for the first 150 qualifiers slated for June 7th.

Coronados also yielding scattered takes of bone-heads, barries white sea bass (one brought to gaff Saturday hit 46 lbs. 13 oz.) and halibut.

Locally, Saturday's strong winds put the damper on what looked like the real beginning of steady yellowtail action at both San Clemente and Catalina Islands. Pacific Sportfishing Landing reported 36 yellows taken at San Clemente last week, topped by a 33 pounder, along with 39 barracudas up to 11 pounds, besides hundreds of bass and rinkydinks. Catalina produced 58 white sea bass up to 18 pounds, 14 halibut between 12 and 15 pounds 737 calicos and bass, and 108 odds and ends.

The Sea Angler out of Pier Point Monday racked up a total of six yellowtail hitting 20 pounds, 16 barries up to 9 pounds, four white sea bass between 10 and 12 pounds and 862 bull and calicos.

Friday Joe Martin's Catalina craft accounted for 19 yellows, several log barries and bulls up to six pounds, hopes were high for Saturday's pont, but angling took a dive. Saw plenty of the popular game fish, but they had decided to play it cagey. Were real touchie with

only a couple of what would be considered solid hook-ups. If the winds would stay down we should see pretty steady action at both our islands.

Trout enthusiasts continue to bring home fish for the fry pan. The Bob Cosby family has been doing really good around the South Fork of the Kern River. Only fished a couple of hours, taking limits of rainbow between nine and 14 inches. Jim Snyder claims a secret hot-spot along the Kern. Took a limit himself in just a short time, sent a couple of buddies when he couldn't go, they also brought home limits on two different trips. One, 18 inches, which is considered pretty fair for stream fishing.

Lake Hemet producing steady takes; venturing were the Ashbys, Dutch Schultz, the Bristows among many who had a ball with real nice trout.

Only a couple of weeks left before someone will be presented the semi-cabin cruiser to be awarded by the Torrance Rod and Gun at the Dream Boat Bounce slated for June 1st at the American Legion Hall. Tickets for the dance may be obtained from any member of said club. The boat to be given away will be just the thing for fishing at Anacapa Island for the monstrous black sea bass. Gene Tolson of Gardena Rod and Gun connected Saturday, big black hit 250 pounds. Looks as though they are beginning to school up, so can be sure members of both Gardena and Torrance will be making week-end forays all vying for the hot spot and the largest monster.
