Holland Housewife Gives Tea Party Pastry Recipe

What do people eat when they attend a tea party in Holland?

Well, chances are they indulge themselves in a tasty morsel best described in English as a syrup waffle. And this is served with steaming hot cups of coffee (about the texture of hot chocolate) mixed liberally with cream or milk.

Mrs. Dirk Rijke, 23816 Park St., a Dutch housewife who, with her family, recently came to this country, divulged the recipe for the Holland "piece de resistance."

It goes like this:

WAFFLES
2½ cups of flour
2½ cubes of butter
¾ cup of sugar
¼ teasp. of pumpkin pie spice
1 egg

Place all of the ingredients into a bowl and blend together

with your hands. Shape into balls the size of walnuts.

In Holland, the Dutch people then place the balls onto a hot "waffle ijzer" (a small waffle iron that makes paper thin waffles about three inches wide) and cooked over an open flame. The iron has two prong-like handles about two feet long.

Since most American homes don't have a "waffle ijzer" Mrs. Rijke recommends the ball of dough be rolled as thin as possible with a rolling pin, then cooked on a waffle iron or a sandwich grill.

A syrup mixture is placed between two waffles, like a sandwich, then left to cool.

Recipe for the syrup is:
1 cube of butter
1 cup of sugar
¼ teasp. pumpkin spice
Mix all ingredients together and heat over a warm flame until warm.

The dainty pastry also is served as a late evening snack, according to Mrs. Rijke.
