



**Blame Children For Two Large Blazes in Grass**


Two large grass fires in Torrance and one in Palos Verdes kept firemen and hoses busy early this week. The Torrance fires reportedly were set by children.

A 35-acre blaze which started near 186th and Bailey Aves. Sunday for a time threatened the KNX transmitter located nearby. Firemen battled the flames for nearly three hours before they finally were brought under control.

Torrance juvenile authorities are questioning two boys who allegedly were seen setting the fire.

In another five-acre blaze Monday, juveniles again were blamed for flames which started on a hillside overlooking Newton School. Firemen also had to battle heavy winds which spread the fire, while residents in the 5000 block on Newton St. used garden hoses to wet down their back yards before fleeing to safety across the street. No homes were involved, although one resident saw smoke coming in his window and thought the house was afire.

Palos Verdes volunteer firemen Monday battled a fire near the 11th green on the Palos Verdes golf course which destroyed an estimated one and a half acres.

Lt. Col. Frank O. Hinckley, son of Mr. and Mrs. K. V. Hinckley, long-time Lomita market owners will return to Narbonne to deliver the address. He is now commander of the Navigation Training Squadron at Ellington Air Force Base, Houston, Tex.

He also will be honored at a special luncheon sponsored by the Lomita Chamber of Commerce at noon on Thursday, June 20, at the Wayfarer's Restaurant, with Mrs. Lynn Chandler as hostess.

**Chosen by Students**

Hinckley was chosen by the Narbonne representatives as an outstanding alumni. As a student at Narbonne High School, he was class valedictorian, member of the Honor Society, editor of the Vigilante, school yearbook, sports editor and humor columnist for the Green and Gold, school newspaper. He won several prizes for his humor columns.

A graduate of Sacramento State College, he holds a masters degree from the University of Southern California. He was commissioned as a second lieutenant in the Army Air Corps in 1943 and won the air medal and a number of ribbons for his service in the South Pacific during World War II. He also was chosen as private navigator for Gen. C. D. Stuer, of the Strategic Air Command, during the war.

**Career Officer**

A career Air Force officer, he is rated as a senior navigator. He is married and the father of two children.

**Maples, Bacon Get Truck Bids**

Bids for pick-up trucks and dump trucks were awarded to Oscar Maples Ford and Bacon Sales by the city council Tuesday.

The bids, received after previous bids had been thrown out by the council, were awarded after Assistant City Manager Donald Mansfield checked all proposals and made his recommendations to the council.

Oscar Maples Ford was the successful bidder for the pick-up trucks at a bid price of \$1477.50 while Bacon Sales of Hermosa Beach was the successful bidder for the dump truck at \$2038.40 plus \$1152.32 for the hoist.

A low bid of \$1444.24 for the pick-up trucks submitted by Frank Taylor Ford of Los Angeles was rejected because the firm did not bid on the dump truck hoist.


