Jim Dandy Markets will open a new 27,000-foot store early next year near the intersection of Hawthorne and Sepulveda Blvds., it was disclosed before the city council Tuesday night.

W. B. Mullin of La Habra had requested permission of the city to remove trees along Sepulveda so the property could be graded and developed. He reported that 90,000 square feet of the property was being acquired by Lucky Stores, Inc., parent company of Jim Dandy Markets, and that the new store was scheduled to be opened early next year.

Alondra Park Improvements Nearly Done

Major improvements to the northwest section of Alondra park, including construction of three new ball fields to provide additional practice and playing sites for Little League teams throughout the Centinela Valley, have now been virtually completed, Supervisor Kenneth Hahn reported this week.

The entire 13-acre section of the park has been landscaped and planted with grass and trees. The ball fields have been laid out and the backstops erected.

Turf Growing
The grass turf is growing nicely and is almost ready for its first cutting.

Supervisor Hahn said that it is hoped that the new playing fields can be put in use in another 30 days.

Two softball fields are located just east of Prairie Ave., one near Manhattan Beach Blvd., the other 400 feet south of the baseball diamond is located approximately 200 feet south of Manhattan Beach Blvd., and 800 feet east of Prairie.

Improvement of the northwest portion of the park makes it available for public use and enjoyment for the first time in many years.

Former Housing Site
A temporary veterans housing project, whose wooden frame buildings did not meet fire, health and safety regulations, formerly occupied the newly-improved park area.

Work was done as a part of Supervisor Hahn's program to develop Alondra park into one of the finest regional recreational centers in Southern California.

SCHOOL OFFICIALS CITE TORRANCE'S LOW COSTS

The Torrance Unified School District has been operating at the most economical cost per pupil of any of the 30 larger unified districts in the state for a number of years, according to school officials.

They cited these figures: In 1954-55, the per pupil cost of these 30 districts varied from \$253.06 to \$381.87 per pupil. The average was \$325.51, but Torrance's cost was \$253.06 per pupil.

Costs Varies
In 1955-56 the cost per pupil varied from \$266.45 to \$397.37. The average cost was \$336.89; Torrance's per pupil cost was \$266.45.

In 1956-57 the amount budgeted for these districts varied from \$304.59 to \$424.85 per pupil. The average cost per pupil budgeted was \$372.00.

Larry George Given \$2500 Scholarship

Laurence Lee George, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Lee George, 120 Via Miradores, has been awarded a \$2500, five-year scholarship by the Pacific Smelting Co., President M. D. Schwartz announced Thursday.

The scholarship is awarded annually to a senior in the Torrance schools who plans to obtain an engineering or scientific degree. The winner may pick the school of his choice, and George plans to enter UCLA.

Chosen on the basis of scholarship, character, citizenship, leadership, and aptitude, George was picked after a personal interview by a committee from the Pacific Smelting Foundation. This is the first time the scholarship has been awarded by the firm which produces zinc slab, zinc oxide, zinc dust, and zinc alloys.

Rolling Hills Phone Office Plans Shown

Plans are under way for a new central office building for the General Telephone Co., in Rolling Hills, according to Dean M. Barnes, operating vice president.

The structure, which will cost in the neighborhood of \$300,000, will contain 17,000 square feet of operating space in addition to a large cable vault beneath the structure. The building has been designed so as to provide for expansion to twice the present size by the use of concrete break-out panels on the south side.

Planned, designed and engineered by Daniel, Mann, Johnson & Mendenhall, the project is located on Highridge Rd., and Crest Rd. in Rolling Hills. The hillside site necessitated the moving of considerable amounts of earth to provide room for a large basement for telephone dial equipment storage, in addition to the cable vault.

Reinforced concrete construction will be employed throughout. Two diesel generators will be provided to make a standby emergency power supply.

The present project is designed to replace the existing facilities currently located in an adjacent building.

ADVENTISTS TO ATTEND CAMP MEET

Sabbath School and church leaders of the Torrance Seventh-day Adventist church are laying plans this week for local participation at the 65th annual Camp Meeting of Seventh-day Adventists in Lynwood, June 13 to 23.

Chey Frederick, Sabbath school leader of the church said that local members will participate in two Sabbath sessions at the giant convalescence on Saturday, June 15, and Saturday, June 22.

"Our members will transfer their regular Saturday program to this great religious convocation," Frederick said. "Our offerings will be given there and officials of our Sabbath School will be available for service there."

Don Hamm, elder of the local church, said that worship services for local members would also emanate from the Lynwood campsite for the two week-ends. He indicated that members will hear top church officials at the two Saturday morning services.
