Ordinance Delayed
In other action at Tuesday's busy session, the council referred a new trailer coach ordinance to Building Superintendent Lee Schless for study and comment, and instructed the city attorney to include "for school purposes" to any proceedings to annex the tide-lands to Torrance. This would enable the school district to include it in assessment rolls should the area ever have a taxable worth, it was pointed out.

An offer by Sam Levy to purchase city property at Torrance Blvd. and Western Ave. for \$80,000 was rejected by the council. The land was independently appraised in excess of \$100,000 more than two years ago, councilmen were told.

17-Day Run Set for Fair

Deadlines for entry in the Los Angeles County Fair, running for 17 days, Sept. 13 through 29, are drawing near, according to Mrs. Gladys Donlavy, entry supervisor, and prospective exhibitors should get their entry blanks into fair headquarters.

Junior feature exhibits are the first to close, on Aug. 20. All clubs and chapters wanting to enter in this section should make arrangements right away, she advised. On Sept. 1, all dairy products classes, other than the milk producers' class, will close. Deadline for entry in the pigeon department will also close on this date.

Majority of entries will close on Sept. 3, including agriculture and horticulture, apilary, domestic arts, open division feature exhibits, flower show, natural resources and cage birds. Both junior and senior livestock entries will close Sept. 4; rabbits, Sept. 6, and poultry, Sept. 10.

Entries received to date have already surpassed the number received at this time in previous years, revealed Mrs. Donlavy. Some \$12,000 premium books were distributed, listing approximately 10,000 competitive sections.

Premium money totals approximately \$200,000 and winners will also take home over 200 trophies. Mrs. Donlavy estimated over two miles of ribbons would also be distributed.

Highlighting the entertainment of the 1957 fair will be the appearance of Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey Circus the first 10 days of the fair. This will be followed by a world's championship rodeo, featuring Gene Autry and Annie Oakley.

Registration Under Way At El Camino

All students planning to enroll for fall courses at El Camino College may secure appointments for registration now, Leo M. Christian, assistant director of student personnel, announced Monday.

Full time students may currently secure counseling and registration appointments in the counseling office, Christian indicated. He defined a full time student as one planning enrollment in 10 or more units. These students, all of whom must have counseling appointments prior to their registration, may enroll until Sept. 6.

Appointments for counseling and registration will be made until that date, although college officials advise the earliest possible date of enrollment.

Part time day or evening students, planning programs of 9 1/2 units or less, may secure permits for registration in the registration office until Aug. 30. Actual registration of these part time students who have received permits to register will be conducted from Aug. 21 to Aug. 30, the college representative noted.

Registration for part time students without permits will be conducted from 5:30 until 7:30 p.m. Sept. 3, 4 and 5, and from 1 to 2 p.m. Sept. 6, Christian stated. He emphasized that early registration insures the best possible programming.

College classes will start on Sept. 16, with late registration closing on Sept. 17.

Moose Aiding MS Campaign

The Torrance Lodge of the Loyal Order of Moose is assisting this week in the fight to combat Multiple Sclerosis by distributing "Hope Chest" posters to businessmen in the South Bay area announcing a drive to raise funds for research, Fred Lydy, governor, announced today.

The National Multiple Sclerosis Society is adding the poster method of raising funds to supplement the usual "march" held at this time each year. The red-white-blue posters will be identified further with the words... "Your dimes make dollars to help fight MS... join the fight, stop the destroyer."

"We hope," said Governor Lydy, "that individuals missed in the house-to-house campaign will not miss the posters at their local stores or banks." The local campaign will continue through the month of August.

Litter Campaign On

Drastic action in the campaign to end littering of public highways has been proposed to the Board of Supervisors by Supervisor Burton W. Chace.

Chace's proposal unanimously approved by the Board of Supervisors calls for the paying of a reward to anyone giving information leading to the arrest and conviction of any person unlawfully dumping any type of rubbish on public or private highways or roads or any public property.

No Settlement In Sight for Building Strike

An impasse—with no settlement in sight—has been reached between Southern California plumbing and sheet metal workers and employers.

Strikes that have tied up the industry entered their seventh week Monday.

The plumbing employers issued a statement Monday amounting to an ultimatum to the union to accept the employers' offer of a 55-cent-an-hour increase or prepare for the strike to continue indefinitely.

The union, which has been demanding 75 cents spread over two years, announced it plans no further dealings with the employers' council but will negotiate with individual contractors.

Representatives of the sheet metal employers also stood firm against the latest wage demand of their union employees. Some 200 members of the Sheet Metal Trades Administrative Council from Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino and Los Angeles counties voted unanimously Saturday to reject a 70-cent hourly hike under a two-year contract, a spokesman said. The employers' top offer is 45 cents for two years.

GARDEN CHATTER

Although Not Common, Brisbane Box Tree Does Well in This Area

A tree that I like very much and that does very well in this area, although not too widely seen, is the Brisbane Box or Tristiana conferta. It is very well adapted to parkway planting or as a specimen tree on the average lot.

It is an oval-topped tree with steeply ascending branches, clear reddish brown smooth bark, large glossy dark green leaves, paler beneath. The tree will reach a height of 40 to 50 feet and sometimes larger. The spread is about three-quarters of the height.

The flowers are star shaped and white and about an inch

and a half across with prominent stamens. These flowers appear in small clusters near the leaf axils starting in late April and lasting until about the first of July. The flowers are followed by an interesting woody capsule.

The tree should have plenty of moisture when young, but as the tree becomes older the irrigation can be decreased and when the tree is well established it displays some tolerance to drought. It is a moderate to rapid grower, likes lots of sun but not much frost.

The tree responds very well to commercial plant food, especially during the Spring.
