Bicycle Safety Campaign Sponsored by Local Moose

"Safety-training the bike rider in your family" is the second phase of a "child safety crusade" being promoted by the Torrance Lodge of the Loyal Order of Moose, Fred Lydy, lodge governor, announced yesterday.

Two out of every three boys and girls injured on bikes, according to traffic statistics, are hurt while violating traffic rules. The Moose are asking parents to test the knowledge of their children of the common-sense rules for safe-biking.

Rules Given
The rules for safe-biking are:
1. Keep your bike under control. This means no stunting or weaving.
2. On your bike, you're expected to obey the same laws that safeguard your dad when he's driving the family automobile.
3. Bicyclists should use the same hand signals as car drivers.
4. Obey traffic lights and come to a full stop at stop signs.
5. Walk your bike across busy streets and slow down at all intersections.
6. Don't hook rides on any type of moving vehicle.
7. Always give a vehicle the right of way at street corners and intersections. Don't whiz out of an alley or driveway without stopping to make sure the road is clear.
8. Above all, don't ride in the dark if you can help it. If you must ride at night, wear something white and turn on your lights.

Defective Bikes
One-fifth of all children hurt on bicycles, according to Joseph Platt, civic affairs chairman of the Moose lodge, are riding defective bikes. Some of the same mechanical skill that dad puts into keeping a younger child's toys repaired should go into making certain his older boy or girl is riding a vehicle that is in perfect condition.

Under the supervision of parents, children should take responsibility for the maintenance of their bikes. The bicycle is no more a toy than your automobile is.

Governor Lydy concluded his announcement with this remark: A youngster safety-trained in the use of his bicycle will never become an accident statistic!
