Three Torrance students have received scholarship awards totaling \$500 at the University of California at Los Angeles, the sponsoring UCLA Alumni Assn. reported this week.

John Emery, 201 Via Los Altos, received a \$300 Gold Shield Award in honor of Dr. Earl J. Miller and Capt. Wilson G. Bingham.

The UCLA Women's Legal Assn. award in law of \$100 was granted to Louise Dale, 2043 W. 182nd St., and the UCLA Law Assn. award of \$100 to James Dale, same address.

The awards to local students were part of a \$16,100 program in which scholarships went to 73 undergraduates and seven graduates, according to President John V. Vaughn of the Alumni Assn.

Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Bartlett have been named "Mr and Mrs. Golden Anniversary" in conjunction with the Torrance Chamber of Commerce sponsored "Salute to the Golden Anniversary of Air Power" Oct. 14-18.

Here Since 1913 Mr. and Mrs. Bartlett came to Torrance in 1913 from Jamestown, N.Y. Both Mr. and Mrs. Bartlett have been active in various clubs in the past. Bartlett was a charter member of Kiwanis in Torrance. He also was a member of the Lion's Club, member of the first Fire Department in Torrance, helped organize the Torrance Athletic Club, Torrance Home Guard, and Torrance Adult Club. Bartlett was on the board of directors of the first Cham-

ber of Commerce in Torrance. Mrs. Bartlett in the past belonged to the Professional Women's Club and Eastern Star. Mrs. Bartlett is also an accomplished pianist and composer and has had various musical pieces published.

Oldest Couple The Bartletts were selected over two other Torrance couples currently celebrating their golden anniversary, due to their combined ages. Air Force and Chamber officials had announced that the winners would be selected on the basis of the oldest couple married in 1907. He is 79; she is 74. All three couples will be guests of honor at the banquet and will receive Golden model airplanes from the Air Force. The runners-up are Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Business Committee Kicks Off Chest Campaign Here

Solicitation in Torrance of small business for the 1957-59 Community Chest campaign got under way with a kick-off breakfast Friday, J. H. Paget, Torrance business chairman for the campaign announced.

At the kick-off, Paget gave his committeemen their assignments and some instructions. "The goal for this year's campaign is \$10,300,000, nine per cent higher than last year's," he told them. "Everyone will have to give that much more than last year in order for the goal to be met."

He encouraged his committeemen to ask people to pledge their donations. "With 167 agencies to help support with one donation, it is better to pay in installments over a period of time. In this way a person can easily give his fair share," he told them.

Spending Explained

He explained why Chest funds are wisely spent. Careful research is done by volunteers to find what services people most urgently require. Then funds are allocated accordingly. The overhead for conducting the campaign is 8.6 per cent, the lowest of any comparable campaign.

"Remember that 80 cents out of every dollar goes to help children," Paget said. To those people who wish to know what others are giving, he advised his committeemen to show the schedule of generous giving which shows what others of comparable incomes gave in the last campaign.


