Y-teen Roll Call has been a national observance of the YWCA since 1948. Coming soon after the opening of school terms, it is a time when special attention is given to the YWCA's work with youth which began in 1881 with the founding of the Little Girls Christian Association in Oakland, California. Today there are more than 400,000 teen-agers, including both girls and boys, the latter known as "associates" in the YWCA participating in some 6,000 Y-teen groups in the United States.

This year Y-teens will have further opportunity to extend their interest in the world-wide aspects of the YWCA through a new world friendship project in which teen-age members of the YWCA throughout the United States will dress dolls of other countries. One doll from each Y-teen club will be selected by the local group for an international display at the YWCA's 21st National Triennial Convention to be held next March in St. Louis, Mo.

The Y-teen program, an important part of the YWCA's work with youth is carried on through democratic clubs. Members choose their own officers and activities and representatives who attend summer camps, local, state, regional or national conference and other similar events.

In a Y-teen program, young people have an opportunity to develop their individual personalities and to assume community leadership. As members of the Y-teens, teen-agers also can participate in the wide variety of YWCA program including craft classes, discussion groups, service projects and many others.
