Program Grows
Gilbert Anderson, chief of the 35 Torrance YMCA Tribes, stated that this meeting will enable more than 100 new dads and sons to join the "Y" and to take part in the Indian lore program that seeks to foster companionship between dad and son.

Anderson said that 10 new Y-Tribes have been formed in the past week at three schools, Howard Wood, Edison, and Flavian Elementary. He invited inquiries from fathers who could not attend the information meetings at those schools.

Growth Seen

Anderson predicted that the YMCA program will grow to include more than 100 Y-Tribes during the present school year. Other schools to receive the program in the next few weeks are Hillside, Seaside, Newton, Parkway, and Meadow Park.

The unique feature of the program is the father and son emphasis, which aims to make the "Pals Forever." A father cannot attend a meeting without his son and vice versa.
