



# TARTARS TIE REDONDO 6-6

## Seahawks Meet Stubborn Foe in Torrance Eleven

Redondo's Seahawks invaded Tartarville Friday night in the Bay League opener and proved a surprisingly stubborn foe for Coach Dick Turner's Tartar varsity as the two teams battled to a 6-6 standstill before a fathers' night crowd of 3500 at the Tartar Stadium.

Following a scoreless first half both teams reached paydirt in the third quarter but both attempts at the extra point were negative.

Seahawk quarterback Bobby Carlson grabbed a Torrance punt standing on his 20 yard line and got two key blocks to spring him loose at the 50 and he outran the Tartar defenders to the goal line on one of the most spectacular 80 yard runs of the season.

### 40 Dads Watch

Over 40 dads watched their Tartar sons battle back to score as Ronnie Veres quarterbacked an 82 yard sustained drive that was topped when Roger Reed bulled his way over from the 4. The play was set up when a Veres to Farold Davis pass was ruled good on a Redondo interference-with-the-receiver ruling. Reed, Manford Mainer, and Bob Farrington packed the pigskin to the goal line in 16 plays, picking up six of their ten first downs in along the way.

Three times in the first half the visitors were threatening inside the Tartar 20 but a stubborn THS forward wall pushed them back when the chips were down.


### Locals Dominate

The locals dominated the game, calling 58 plays from scrimmage compared to the Hawks 34. Surprisingly enough the two quarterbacks, Carlson and Veres, attempted only 14 passes between them, with Redondo connecting 3 times in 9 tries. Veres' only completed aerial came on the interference ruling.

All told, the local backs ground out a total of 206 yards and the big forward line held the visitors to a mere 114 passing and rushing.

Friday night the two teams swing back into action with the Seahawks, still winless in 5 outings, attempting to stop powerful Santa Monica, while the Tartars will be playing before a homecoming crowd and Queen Joyce Cannon when Mira Costa comes to town in the second round of Bay League play. Last week the Mustangs were on the long end of a 16-14 score with Inglewood.

## Beverly Hills Humbles Saxons, Scoring in Four Quarters of First Pioneer League Game

Visiting Beverly Hills humbled a proud Saxon varsity eleven Friday afternoon to the tune of 31-18 in the opening game of the Pioneer Loop season.

The Normans scored in every quarter, but it was not until the second half that the North High squad crossed pay dirt.

Hershel Lawson opened the game with a kick off that caught the Normans deep.

Beverly then fumbled, but recovered on their own 47. The Saxons held the line, despite a weight advantage by the Normans of 40 pounds.

Normans Score

The Normans' first score came on an intercepted pass play. A pass by Jim Whitley intended for Chuck Webb was intercepted by Don Huntsman for the Normans and seconds later he crossed the goal line for the first score.

Early in the second quarter an aerial attempt by Whitley, meant for Bob Romero, was intercepted. Beverly was again forced to kick, and a clipping penalty against the Saxons placed the pigskin on their own one yard line.

A fake punt by Thomsen gained five yards, Whitley carrying the ball. After additional yardage, the Saxons finally were forced to punt.

Second TD

The Normans then began a slow, gradual gain which saw Bob Shirn go over for the second score.

A series of penalties put the Saxons on their own 10 yard line and a bad punt by Full-back Thomsen gave the visitors the ball on the Saxon eight. A fourth down pass by

Gary Kellstrom to Steve Pauley gave the Normans their third touchdown.

The half ended shortly after the kickoff and the Beverly eleven led 18-0.

Six For Saxons

The game began to look a little hopeless for the locals when they took the kickoff and marched down the field with a series of handoffs and punts to put Thomsen over for the first Saxon TD.

Responding with a couple of quick aerials by Quarterback Kellstrom, put the Normans back in the scoring area with Steve Pauley scooting across for six points.

During the first few minutes of the fourth quarter Whitley handed off to Thomsen who in turn passed to Carlos Norris, a play good for a 30 yard gain. Eddie Jauresqui carried the ball into the promised land for the second Saxon score.

Joe Berger, Beverly left half, the broke through what seemed to be an immovable Saxon line and romped 50 yards for the insurance touchdown for the visitors.
