## Organized to Help, Club Lends a Hand

"These things are measured by their weight, not by their number" may well be applied to the work of a group of women, about 12 in number, whose hours of effort to bring happiness to many during the past two years, came to light this week. They are known as the New South Bay Women's club.

When 120 "pinky" puppets, being provided for hospitalized children by the auxiliary of the Torrance Memorial hospital, were turned in last week it was then that this small group of workers became known. These puppets add hours of delight to the hospital stay of young patients. When this new club heard of the project, they asked to help.

It was in February 1955, that a neighborhood group was organized under the leadership of Mrs. Vern Shaw, 1904 Firmona. Their purpose—to do something worthwhile. They didn't have to look far. The children's ward at the Harbor General hospital was their first philanthropy. They made baby clothes favors and toys and took them down to the hospital. Their reward... a little child's smile.

In 1956, the group of women adopted an elderly ladies ward at the hospital. There they were given slippers, hampers, place mats and clever little favors to brighten their days.

Last August, members read about the hospital auxiliary's project to furnish each child at the Torrance hospital with a "Pinky." Since then, they have turned out 120 puppets.

Plans now are underway to furnish Christmas baskets to five needy families in the Bay area. Food for these baskets will be provided from the member's monthly dues.
