## Rev. Taylor Finds Holy Land Peaceful, but Extremely Tense

The land of the "Price of Peace" today still is outwardly peaceful, but is seething with unrest and rumors of war.

That was the observation of the Rev. John L. Taylor, pastor of the First Methodist Church, who recently returned to his pulpit after a three-month tour through Europe and the Holy Land.

**Tensions High**  
Tensions are high throughout the Near East, he reported, although he and his wife reported no feelings of hostility directed toward them as Americans. They happened to be in Damascus at the time the Syrian government asked for the recall of several American officials, but felt no effects of this. They were, however, the only westerners staying at their particular hotel.

In the midst, they saw very few western tourists.

The common people of this troubled area are not unfriendly toward the United States, the minister reported, but object to our assistance, which they feel should still be part of the Arab world. The man on the street does not particularly like Russia, he said, but government leaders are trying to bargain with the Reds to get more help from the West.

**Nationalism Rampant**  
Nationalism is rampant throughout the area, he said, and Nasser seems to be tremendously popular in Egypt, as a man who has put his country on the map and who has brought stability to an unstable land.

People of the Mideast tend to identify the U. S. government with the policies of Britain, which is heartily disliked. Rev. Taylor reported. They seem to feel that the United States is not sure just what it is trying to do in the area, but that it is exploiting them for its own purposes—as buffer states against the Russians.

In Israel, however, the local minister found the people claiming that the Arabs were not developing the country as it should have been and had refused to accept a reasonable settlement on the boundary question. Israel, however, appeared far more prosperous than its Arab neighbors, he said.

Throughout Europe and the Near East, the Taylors found many people who wanted to come to the United States, "which they seem to think is a land of milk and honey where nobody works and everybody gets big salaries."

While in the Holy Lands, the Taylors visited the sites of many of the famous Bible stories—the birthplace of Abraham, Bethlehem, the Dead Sea, Sea of Galilee, the Jordan River, Tiberias, Capernaum, Cana, Nazareth, Hafia, and, of course, Jerusalem.

**Israel Visited**  
They had to visit the sites in Arab countries first, entering Jerusalem and Israel by the Mandelbaum Gate. Tourists cannot go from Israel to the Arab countries, although they can travel the other way.

In Europe, the Taylors toured through England, France, Holland, Germany, Austria, Italy, and Greece, but had to cancel their scheduled visit to Yugoslavia because visas were not approved. For some reason, churchmen have a difficult time getting into that country, although ordinary tourists seem to have little trouble.

**Europe Rebuilding**  
In Europe, there is little talk of another war, but rebuilding from the last one, Rev. Taylor reported. They seem to feel that war or no war is beyond their ability to control and they feel a more immediate job is at hand. The world situation has been largely turned over to the larger powers, he said.

Europeans found it hard to understand the situation which led to the trouble in Little Rock, he reported, and view the whole matter with considerable surprise.

The Taylors visited the boyhood home of John Wesley, founder of the Methodist Church, in Edworth, England, and other Methodist institutions in various parts of Europe. They also visited Christa Volkman, an exchange student here last year, in Vienna, Austria. They spent considerable time viewing ruins of ancient civilizations—the Mycenaean and ancient Greek in Greece, ancient Egyptian ruins in a Cairo museum, the Bible lands, and Pompeii.

**Impressive Ruins**  
Most impressive, Rev. Taylor thought, were the Mycenaean ruins—honeycomb tombs, walled cities, and an amphitheatre still used—all built 2000 years before Christ. The ruins at Baalbek, including old temples to Jupiter, in Lebanon also were interesting, he said.

"It helps you to realize that our present civilization is based on what was discovered centuries ago," he declared. "We need to appreciate what they did in relation to what we have now. The basic desires have been the same over the centuries."

## 'PROBATION' IS TOPIC FOR SUNDAY

The continuing regeneration and transformation of the individual man and woman through spiritualization of thought and deed up to the spiritual goal—conscious heavenly being—is discussed in the Lesson-Sermon "Probation After Death" in each Church of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday.
