Needlework Guild Story Traced Back 75 Years

The story of the Needlework Guild is not new but has a dedicated past of seventy-five years both throughout the United States and in England. Peninsula Volunteers, however, have written a new chapter to this already outstanding story within the past five years, right here in our own area.

This chapter is told by its hundreds of members with pride and enthusiasm, especially during the month of October when, in this great organization, activity is at its peak.

Five years ago, N. G. A. started in this area with twenty-six volunteers and today it is impossible to number the hundreds who participate annually in this charitable work. The Guild is a non-sectarian national organization with its country-wide branches dedicated to collecting and distributing "new clothes for the needy." The Peninsula Volunteers are a branch of the Los Angeles chapter of N. G. A. whose main objective is the assistance it can give to the needy agencies within its immediate area. These local agencies who are assisted by new clothing donations are: Barton Hill School, Harbor General Hospital, Homer Toberman Settlement House, Del Amo Street School, Harlan Shoemaker School, Harbor Health Center, Pueblo Center Mahar House, Sandpiper shoe fund and the Assistance League of San Pedro where shoes are purchased also.

Decorating of all the new garments and shoe fund contributions was held at the Assistance League in San Pedro from ten until two o'clock on Thursday, Oct. 24. Membership in the guild is open to everyone who will donate two new garments of clothing or a cash donation for shoes once each year. Mrs. William C. Farner, sewing chairman for the Guild reports that while well over five thousand garments were collected last year, the need is greater than ever and no matter how many or how much you give there is never enough to fill all the requests.

As a fitting climax to the Ingathering, a tally meeting and reports from all sections was held the following day, Friday, Oct. 25, at eleven in the morning. This event, at which several hundred N. G. Bay Harbor Osteopathic Assistant Chapter Formed

Presentation of a charter will feature the November meeting of the newly organized Bay Harbor chapter of the California Osteopathic Medical Assistants' Association, it was announced yesterday by Mrs. Louise Melton, temporary secretary-treasurer of the group. The meeting tentatively set for Nov. 25 will be held in San Pedro.

Mrs. Verrill Ellwanger of North Hollywood, state president of the organization, will present the charter to the new group. Mrs. Ellwanger was the principal speaker at an organization meeting attended by more than 30 nurses, receptionists and technicians of osteopathic doctors of the area at the Wayfarers' cafe in Lomita. More than 100 charter members are expected to be signed up by the time of the charter presentation.

Women of the group plan to aid in the general fund drive campaign now under way to bring a \$1,100,000 Bay Harbor Osteopathic Hospital to this area. Present plans call for the new 50-bed structure to be built on a six-acre site on Lomita Blvd. just east of President Ave. in Lomita.

Osteopathic doctors have contributed more than \$200,000 toward the one third of the building cost which must be pledged locally to insure final allotment of a \$594,882 Hill-Burton Fund grant approved last August for the hospital construction. The district still has about \$75,000 to raise before the Dec. 9, 1957, deadline.


