
### Spin and Marty At Disneyland

Spin and Marty, television stars of Walt Disney's Mickey Mouse Club, will make a three-day personal appearance at Disneyland during the Veteran's Day week end, Nov. 9, 10 and 11, it was announced today.

David Stollery and Tim Considine, who portray the roles of Marty Markham and Spin Evans in the western ranch adventure series, "Spin and Marty," shown daily over the ABC-TV network, will appear four times daily at the Anaheim park.

During their Disneyland appearance they will board a surrey daily at 11:15 a.m. at the Town Square and follow the Disneyland Band down Main St. to the Plaza Gardens. They will then sign autographs at the Plaza Gardens until 12 noon.

Following lunch, Spin and Marty will return to Plaza Gardens and sign autographs at 1:15-2 p.m.; 2:30-3 p.m. and 3:45-4:30 p.m. during each daily appearance.

### CATHOLIC HIGH SCHOOL WORK NOW COMPLETED

Completion of Bishop Montgomery High School, the fifth constructional archdiocese school to be built during the past year as a product of the Catholic Education Fund campaign of 1956, was announced this week. Students occupied the classroom units in September, and the final landscaping work was completed last month.

The new school plant, located in Torrance, was designed by Albert C. Martin and Associates. Contractor on the \$400,000 project was the McNeil Construction Co. of Los Angeles.

**Five Buildings**  
Five contemporary buildings with a normal capacity of 600 students comprise the school unit. Four buildings are of post and beam, frame and stucco construction. The fifth building, the locker-shower building, is of concrete tilt-up construction.

The administration and chapel building face each other across a covered court. The chapel roof is supported by free-standing columns outside the walls, which are largely of colored glass.

**Additions Planned**  
Covered walkways connect the buildings and central corridors criss-cross each classroom structure. Modular laminated beam construction makes all interior partitions remov-

able or movable to facilitate any remodeling. Both classrooms are designed for future additions, and long-range planning call for a school accommodating 1200 to 1600 students.

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
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
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### As I See It
