

Leuzinger Only Obstacle Blocking Torrance High Hopes of Championship

Leuzinger, the only team that stands in the way of Torrance's path to a championship playoff with Santa Monica, lines up against the Tartars Saturday on their home gridiron to battle the undefeated Tartars in a Bay League clash. Game time is 8 p.m.

If Coach Dick Turner's outfit can get by the winless Olympians, the maroon and grey will travel to Samohi next week to battle the Vikings for the Bay title.

For the upcoming Saturday tilt, the first of the season for both teams, the Tartars will be at full team strength with Bobby Grajeda's healing fractured ankle ready for action.

Strong Line The game will feature the THSers' strong forward wall, which has allowed only two

touchdowns in the three circuit outings, while the locals have compiled a 2-0-1 record. Leuzinger is still looking for their first victory in seven tries, last week playing to a 6-6 draw with Redondo.

Coach Turner's charges so far have been the surprise of the Bay League, upsetting two powerhouses and scoring another in non-league play. Victims have been El Segundo, 13-12, on a t.d. scored in the final 20 seconds; Mira Costa, 7-0, a team that was previously picked as co-favorites with Samohi to cop the league

crown; and last week, Inglewood, rated as six-point favorites over THS with the fastest backfield in the loop.

For the Saturday outing the Tartars will be favored for the first time this season but Jim Chadwick's outfit is due for a big game, and Torrance is a traditional rival, so you can bet your hat they'll be fired up to topple the locals.

EC Warriors in Last-ditch Try

El Camin' College Warriors travel to Bakersfield this week-end for their fourth Metro encounter, after dropping an 18-6 decision to league-leading San Diego on the rain-soaked Camino gridiron Saturday night.

A crowd of nearly 2500 braved heavy rains to view the clash, but the final gun found less than 1000 fans remaining. Both clubs punted back and forth for two scoreless periods before the rain subsided and allowed the Knights to get their attack into high gear.

The Warriors had two first period opportunities but weather conditions and a tough San Diego line halted both threats. The first chance came when Camino recovered an S.D. fumble on the Knight 37. Larry Manly made six, then hit Curt Curtis with a 22-yard aerial to the nine. Bruce Seifert picked up four, but Manly was dropped for three- and four-yard losses, and his fourth down pass to Kirk King was incomplete.

Punt Exchanges After three punt exchanges the Warriors were on the San Diego 40, and Manly threw 30 yards to Tom Brown on the 10, only to have this threat fall short.

On the first play after the second half kickoff, Manly fumbled on his own 33, and the Knights' John Davies recovered. Benny Martin moved it to the E.C. six in two carries, and two plays later scored from the five. The p.a.t. was no good.

The Warriors tied it up with two minutes left in the third quarter when Manly connected on a 52-yard pass to Brown from the Camino 48, but Billy Reames' conversion was also no good.

After a San Diego attack bogged down on the El Camino 20, and the Warriors failed to gain, Manly's punt went out of bounds on the Camino 35. Martin then went 26 yards to the Warrior nine, and quarter-back Bill Tellous passed to Geoff Langston on a tackle eli-

gible play for the score. Again the conversion attempt failed.

Final Touchdown

Another bad punt set up the final San Diego touchdown. This time the kick went out on the 37. Dick Morris moved to the 24, but a backfield in motion penalty cost the Knights five yards. Dave Grayson then skirted the Camino end for 27 yards to the two, and Tellous scored on a quarterback sneak.

The muddy field led to constant jersey changes, and it was often impossible to distinguish between players. Leonard Burnett, San Diego end, proved a constant thorn in the Warriors' side, making many fine defensive stops to aid in the Knights' victory.
