Dozing Still Causes Many Auto Crashes

Fatigue and dozing at the wheel are definite accident causing factors warns the California Highway Patrol.

"An average of over 270 drivers a month either fatigued or asleep at the wheel are involved in traffic accidents on California streets and highways," declared Patrol Commissioner B. R. Caldwell. "These factors are easily controlled through proper consideration of the hazards connected with driving while excessively tired or sleepy.

"Fatigue and sleepiness are usually the result of long and continuous driving hours, failure to get adequate rest each night while on a trip, and trying to pack an excessive number of miles into a few hours," Caldwell stated. "Single-car, running-off-roadway type accidents frequently involve a driver asleep or dozing at the wheel.

"The control of this situation is simple," he concluded. "Shorter driving hours, frequent rest stops, adequate sleep each night, and sharing the driving will help eliminate accidents caused by fatigue and sleepiness."

Local Firemen Slate Muscular Dystrophy March


