Arline Koschel, 21618 Linda Dr., has good reason to be bitter. A thief stole the wheels right off her car Thursday.



BUS RIDES TO PARADE SCHEDULED

Buses to take Torrance residents to the Pasadena Rose Parade will leave the Torrance Bus Depot at 7 p.m. on Jan. 1, Chamber of Commerce officials said Friday.

Torrance municipal buses will carry local residents to and from the parade at a round-trip cost of \$2.75, including tax. The buses will park on the grounds of Pasadena City College, Hill and Colorado, with grandstand seats available at extra cost by the college.
