### Democrats to Shy Away From Give-Away Laws

Many people have asked me what I expect to happen during the 1959 regular session of the California State Legislature in view of the fact that we now have a Democratic governor, a Democratic lieutenant governor, a Democratic attorney general, an overwhelmingly Democratic legislature, and Democrats in all Constitutional offices except that of secretary of state. Probably the principal reason for the question is that the Democrats themselves are worried about what would happen if the legislature attempted to enact into law all the planks in the 1958 Democratic state platform.

Without enumerating the vast number of extremely generous promises made to all sorts and conditions of people in the Democratic state platform of 1958, I can accurately say that if even one-half of the planks of that platform were enacted into law it would be necessary for the legislature to raise all existing taxes and levy taxes on many things not now taxed at all by the state.

If the Legislature did not do this, then the state could not pay its bills and it would have to issue "warrants" in lieu of legal tender. This would cause trouble because the "warrants" given in place of money would be discounted, that is, accepted at something less than face value, which would displease the recipients of the warrants.

On the other hand, if the State raised existing taxes and levied new taxes, then those paying these taxes would be exceedingly unhappy. In either event, the people of California would become so angry that at the election in 1960, several Democratic incumbents in both the Assembly and the Senate would be displaced by Republicans.


If I understand the thinking of the people of California, the Democrats have more to lose by increasing our tax burdens than they have by repudiating about one-half of the planks in the 1958 Democratic state platform, hence it is my belief that they will take the latter course.

Obviously, those pressure groups who are looking for hand-outs based upon the hopes raised by the 1958 Democratic state platform will become angry, too, but I doubt that the Democrats in the legislature are as afraid of their wrath as they are of the great mass of taxpayers of both political parties.
