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BEST BUYS FOR THE WEEK

In Torrance Markets

Now is the time we expect plenty of pork, turkeys and eggs. Beef supplies are running a little lower.

Apples, avocados, winter pears, are the most abundant fresh fruit items. There should be plenty of cabbage, celery, winter squash . . . with heavy shipments of potatoes moving in. There are large stocks of canned and frozen peas. With food distribution still disrupted in certain areas of Southern California you may not find retailers eager to sell case lots of that canned and frozen vegetable, but they are a buy you still want to watch for.

The abundance of eggs is a boon to the menu planner. Eggs au Gratin is a colorful, piping hot casserole for cold weather. It's easy. Simply, it's layers of sliced hard-cooked eggs, cooked macaroni (bowl or shells are pretty), drained canned peas or cooked frozen peas. Smother with a sauce made by combining condensed cream of mushroom soup with an equal portion of undiluted evaporated milk. Top with grated cheese and bake until bubbly hot, it may take about an hour, at 350°F. Good with apple and celery salad with its tart crispness.

How do you make your meat selections?

Meat usually serves as the core of menu planning. Even thoughtful shoppers who have preplanned their meat purchases may change their choice once they study the price and

Also keep in mind when looking at the price of pork that the whole hog is not edible. Retail pork cuts make up less than half the original live weight of the hog. This loss in processing accounts for much of the margin between live price and the price of pork in your market.

For your own family you are concerned with the percentage of lean meat in various cuts:

quality of cuts available in the market. So it's a good idea to check the meat department early in a shopping tour.

Knowing how much you will spend for meat gives you a chance to do a little budget juggling. You may be lucky and find a less expensive meat than originally planned.

Let's look at pork . . . an abundant meat. Remember, pigs aren't all pork chops, or all hams. There are many other cuts . . . equally high in food value, but less in demand and lower in price.

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
