- 1 1/2 cups milk
- 1/2 cup cornmeal
- 2 tbsps. butter
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 cup grated American cheese

Combine milk, cornmeal, butter and salt; cook and stir over low heat until thick and smooth. Add cheese and stir over low heat until melted. Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon colored. Fold through the cheese mixture. Beat egg whites until stiff, but not dry and fold gently, but thoroughly, through the cheese mixture. Pour into 1 1/2 qt. casserole; set in shallow pan of hot water. Bake in 350° F. oven 50 minutes to one hour, or until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean. Serve at once. Makes five or six servings.



