Inc. the May Co. store is considered the ultimate in present day department store architecture and design. The building is contemporary in mood, completely air conditioned, and the choice of exterior and interior colors, the landscaping and windows treatments all combine to emphasize the indoor-outdoor quality of casual California living at its best.

THE STORE has three floors, plus a lower level (basement) and mezzanine. The main floor has four entrances. The south entrance faces the South Bay Bowling Center; the north and west entrances lead from the shopping center mall; and the east entrance faces Hawthorne Blvd.

The main floor includes the women's fashion accessory shops, the Boulevard or Budget ready-to-wear shops, and the men's shops (including clothing and furnishings). Here also are cameras and photo accessories, drugs, clocks and fine jewelry, liquor and toiletries, liquor and garment shop, and a number of service shops.

FROM THE main floor, elevators or escalators provide easy access to all other floors. On the lower level is the Bay Shore Tea Room and fountain, as well as the book department, garden tools, housewares, lug-


gage, major and small appliances, paints, sporting goods, toy department, shoe repair department, and the auditorium.

The lower level, including the Bay Shore Tea Room which has a capacity of 216 in the dining room and 52 at the fountain, was designed by Albert C. Martin and Assoc. while the balance of the store's interiors were designed by the firm of Chaix and Johnson.

THE SECOND floor is a fashion world. Here are all Midway's fashions in beautifully styled specialty shops. The decor features hand painted Shou-Ji silk wallpaper, charming wormy wood chestnut woods, and marbled glass mirror walls. Coats and suits for juniors, misses and women;

clothes, furs, and millinery are here; also the bridal salon, a special shop for maternity clothes, a tall shop, a secluded corset salon, lingerie, and sportswear for all sizes. Here too is located the Youth Center, featuring Boys', Girls' and Infants' wear and furnishings, as well as a complete Boy Scout, Girl Scout and Campfire Girls department.

ON THE third floor the use of color and special woods is ingeniously worked out to provide appropriate settings for furniture, housewares, lamps, curtains, electrical appliances, and floor coverings. The decor is cleverly designed to give maximum departmental separation, thus simplifying shopping. An entire corner is devoted to music on the

third floor so that television, radios, phonographs and records are available in full selection.

The third floor also includes the beauty salon, which utilizes subtle shades of white metal and silk panel screens. Here feminine sophistication is enhanced by use of charcoal silk walls and ice blue foil screens to set off the appointment counter of white formica and vinyl grass cloth.

THE INTERIOR arrangement of the store has been planned to simplify the shopper's problems and save her time by setting up related departments near each other. All children's needs are on one floor, all fashions are on one floor, all men's shops are grouped together. In addition, a score of special service departments enable the shopper to solve many problems in one trip, and under one roof. Home decorating consultants are available on the home furnishings floor; a bridal consultant to solve all wedding problems offers service in bridal salon; and fur storage and with repair departments are all conveniently located.

 which honors her late husband. The plaque will be placed in the "Stork Club" to remind all of Dr. Stevenson's great contribution to his profession during an active career that spanned more than 50 years.

"Stork Club—To all who come to this happy place, Welcome," the plaque reads. "Your community hospital medical staff salutes Arthur P. Stevenson, M.D., who delivered the first baby in Torrance Memorial Hospital in 1925 and devoted himself to a life of service in medicine."

THE FIRST infant delivered here was Torrance Frost, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Frost, who lived at 1622 W. 220th St. then.

Presenting the plaque to Mrs. Stevenson were Drs. George Andersen, Philip Halloran and Rodney Stetson. Dr. Halloran is chief of staff at Torrance Memorial, Dr. Stetson is the immediate past president. Dr. Andersen headed a committee of staff members who planned the memorial to Dr. Stevenson.

In announcing the "Stork Club" memorial, Dr. Andersen said his colleagues wanted a living memorial to the pioneer Torrance physician. He cited the fact that Dr. Stevenson had delivered more than 3000 babies while associated with the hospital, and was one of the dedicated persons who helped to provide the city with its own hospital.
