March 15-22 has been designated as Health Week in Los Angeles County by the Community Health Assn., sponsor of the event, according to Dr. Roy O. Gilbert, county health officer.

Highlight of the week will be the annual luncheon to be held at the Biltmore Hotel from 11:45 a.m. to 2 p.m. Wednesday, March 18. Featured speaker will be Norman H. Topping, M.D., president of the University of Southern California.

Cooperating in the observance of Health Week will be voluntary and official health agencies, together with the County Medical Association, numerous religious groups, and public and private schools. 
Freeway Allocation Sought By Lomita Chamber Leaders
