DOUBLE SESSIONS SLASHED

The number of north Torrance students on double session was cut from 47 to 10 per cent of the total enrollment with the opening of Hamilton, Magruder, and Yukon Schools recently.

A check indicated that only 16 of 151 elementary school classes is now on double session, compared with 72 before the opening. Officials reported that the transfer of the 1360 students to the new schools went as smoothly as could be expected.

Homes Hit By Rains Eligible For SBA Loans

Owners of homes or businesses damaged by destroyed as a result of heavy rains and mud slides will be eligible to apply for 3 per cent rehabilitation loans from the government as a result of a designation made this week by the Small Business Administration which officially designated Los Angeles County as a disaster area.

The designation was made following a study of the heavy rains of January 5, which reportedly destroyed or partially destroyed more than 30 residences, according to Donald McLarnan, regional Director of the S.B.A.

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
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
