**Changes in Veteran Rules Told by Service Officer**

There are probably many veterans in this area, on Veterans Administration pension, who have never filed for Social Security disability payments but now may be entitled to them, Veterans Service Officer Sara R. Bridges declared today.

And, she added, the recent law change also enables certain veterans to rescind their waiver of VA pension in favor of VA compensation, in order to avoid deduction from their Social Security disability payments.

BEFORE Congress passed

Public Law 85-840, VA pension payments were subtracted from any monthly SS disability payments. So a veteran entitled to either compensation or pension from the VA would normally refuse his pension in order to collect both compensation and SS payments — compensation (payments for service-connected disability) not affecting Social Security rights.

Now, however, the law allows payment for both Social Security and VA pension. In some cases, the pension which a veteran refused was actually

larger than the compensation for which he was rated—but he had to let it go in order to retain his eligibility for Social Security.

SERVICE Officer Bridges says her office will be glad to assist such veterans in notifying the VA of their desire to rescind their pension waiver in order to draw larger benefits under the new law.

In the same manner, veterans drawing VA pension who have never filed for Social Security disability payments—because they were not eligible under the previous law—may obtain further details from the service officer or the area Social Security office.

The Brownies, in authentic costumes, presented dances of Germany, Canada, Japan, Mexico, and Hawaii.




