The Torrance-Lomita of Realtors will link a hundreds of other across the nation next to launch observance for Week, April 12-18, ing to Board President neth M. Miller.

The special week, wh being proclaimed by gover and mayors in many states cities, is designed to in the public of the lofty a and high professional serv of realtors, Miller said.

Among the highlights of local program to tell ab realtors is a breakfast meet Tuesday morning, April 14, the Torrance YWCA, Cars and Plaza Del Amo.

NEW MEMBERS of the board will be inducted and a number of Torrance civic leaders are scheduled to attend. The program will be designed to explain the theme, "Realtors—Those Pledged to an Established Code of Ethics."

"A realtor is a broker who is a member of the local real estate board and the National Assn. of Real Estate Boards," Miller explained.

"Only membership in these organizations entitle a broker to use the term 'realtor' as his trademark," he added.

STANDARDS of the realtors' code of ethics are higher than those set forth in the state licensing laws, and the local boards are empowered to see that its members live up to the provisions of the code, Miller explained. Those skirting the code's terms face loss of membership, and consequently, loss of the right to use the term "realtor" in connection with their profession.
