As a taxpayer, I would gladly bend my head to look out of the windshield at the "Chinese Lanterns." Let's face it, we (yes, we taxpayers) save \$3700 or more than 80 per cent on each intersection by using the cheaper model—that is if our politicians will let us save it.

Just think, it takes the whole tax bill of at least 10 or more families to pay for this extravagance at each and every corner where the fancy signals are installed. (Subtracting school and county taxes from each tax bill probably means that it takes nearer fifty families to pay for one signal installation.)

Granted there are many corners that don't lend themselves to the "Chinese Lantern" type of installation, but there are still many that do. As far as safety is concerned, I doubt very much if there is too much difference between them—at any rate, I'm sure we'd be way ahead safety-wise if we put that same \$3700 into more policemen, left-turn pockets, etc. Next year's budget apparently calls for \$50,000 for new signals. I'm sure we could cut that in half by the judicious use of "Chinese Lanterns" and put the \$25,000 saved into something we need a lot more.
