

## STATION WAGON SHOW OPENS HERE TODAY

Opening today at the South Bay Shopping Center, 174th St. and Hawthorne Blvd., is "Design for Station Wagon Living," an exhibit of latest ideas for outdoor recreation and travel. The display will remain at the center through May 23. Admission is free.

Highlighting the 10-day exhibition will be a drawing for \$1000 in merchandise certificates to be given away the final day of the display by Sandra Jennings, Miss California and runner-up in the Miss America Pageant in 1958.

Merchandise certificates will include a \$500 first prize, \$250 second place, and ten \$25 awards. Registration cards are available to the public at any of the South Bay Center's 40 stores. No purchase is required.

### Optimists to See Film on California

Members of the Torrance Optimist Club will see the Title Insurance and Trust Co. film "This Is My Land," at their regular meeting at the Palms Monday evening.

Wayne Pickett, representing the firm, will present the film which depicts Southern California and its tremendous growth, according to the Club President, Dave Figueredo.

The film traces the history of land in California from the early rancho days, and shows how the many actions of people can effect their ownership to real property, Figueredo said. Pickett will be presented by Program Chairman Lee Wilson.

### Roundups Set At Five Schools

Five Torrance schools plan kindergarten round-ups within the next week, according to school officials.

Parents of children who will enter kindergarten for the first time next fall may register their children, bringing along a birth certificate or other proof of age. Children who will be five years old on or before this Dec. 2 are eligible to attend kindergarten in September.

Round-ups are slated as follows: Edison School next Tuesday and Wednesday; Jefferson School today; Madrona School today and next Thursday; Meadow Park School tomorrow and June 3; and Riviera School today.

## Doctors Seen as Key to Cutting Car Accident Toll

A new guide to assist physicians in determining the fitness of motorists to drive was published recently by the American Medical Assn. The guide, which appeared in a recent issue of the Journal of the AMA, was prepared by the committee on medical aspects of automobile injuries and deaths, after a two-year study.

According to the committee, the purpose of the guide is to call attention to the areas in which the medical profession may be of help in combating the serious health problem caused by the large number of automobile accidents.

In an accompanying editorial, the committee said, "Injuries suffered in automobile accidents are an important health problem in the United States. About 37,000 persons were killed in automobile accidents in 1958 and about 5 million were injured seriously enough to require medical attendance or restriction of their activity for one day or longer.

"HUMAN FAILURE," the report noted, "overshadows all other factors in the production of highway accidents. The human mechanism must be in good condition to cope with the split second timing needed to maneuver high speed motor vehicles. The key to ultimate success in automobile prevention lies in the driver—his intelligence, his sense of personal and social responsibility, his reactions to various stimuli in normal conditions and under stress, and his driving ability in good health and in illness."

In general, the guide stated, an individual should be assessed medically to determine the answers to the following questions:

- (1) Has the patient any physical and mental ability to manipulate the controls?
- (2) Is the patient likely to suffer excessive fatigue that will impair his driving ability?
- (3) Does the patient have the required vision and hearing for safe driving?
- (4) Has the patient any physical or mental disorder likely to cause confusion or a sudden loss of consciousness while driving?
- (5) Is the patient likely to suffer a temporary impairment of mental, physical or functional capacity due to alcohol, drugs, infections or medical treatment?
- (6) Does the patient have good emotional control or has he signs of antisocial behavior or an emotional disturbance making it unsafe for him to drive?

THE COMMITTEE said that the physician is qualified by training to ascertain the physical, mental, emotional or physiological impairments of an individual. He is in a good position to evaluate these impairments in relation to safe driving ability.

Frequently, it may be necessary for a physician, recognizing his responsibility for the safety of his patient and the public, to caution the patient against driving for a certain period of time or even permanently.

In conclusion, the committee said, "It is possible that the next decade will see a greatly increased emphasis upon more stringent physical standards for licensing. It is believed that more and more patients will turn to their physicians for advice and assistance in this regard."

"On the basis of present knowledge, it is believed that a conscientious medical evaluation of the individual's fitness to drive safely, with appropriate follow-up, can reduce motor vehicle accidents very significantly."
