Tweedy Heads Loan Office In Torrance

John A. Tweedy, associated with banks and financial firms since 1930, has been named manager of Southwest Savings and Loan's Torrance office and vice president of the association. He assumed the positions the first of this year.

The new loan company manager's banking career of 27 years was interrupted for more than three years during World War II when he served with the Fourth Infantry Division in Europe. He was twice wounded in action, receiving the Purple Heart with cluster, and was given the Bronze Star for "heroic achievement."

EARLY BIRD MAY SAVE TIME, DMV MAN WARNS

The early bird may save himself lots of time, E. S. Caldwell, manager of the Department of Motor Vehicle office in Torrance warned local residents Friday.

The annual registration period for cars is now under way at the local office at 1907 Border Ave., with motorists being issued green stickers for their license plates.

"Right now, a person can complete the transaction in about six minutes," Caldwell said. "People who waited until

Here are some tips that may save you a headache when you go to attach the 1958 green sticker to your auto license plate:

1. Don't try to remove the old 1957 red sticker. You'll only make a mess of it.
2. Remove any wax or road dirt from the old sticker.
3. Warm the area covered by the sticker by briefly passing the palm of your hand to it.
4. Apply the new 1958 sticker over the old, following

instructions printed on the back.

Local residents should receive cards through the mail which tell the amount of fees to be paid. They should bring the whole card to the DMV offices. If there are no changes, other than a change of address, the registration may be completed at the Bank of America in either Gardena or Redondo Beach.

The old owners may receive registration slips for cars they sold during the latter part of 1957. If so, Caldwell said, the cards should be disregarded.

Public Warned Of Danger in Gebhardt Chili

Local health authorities received word today from the California State Department of Public Health that Gebhardt Eagle Chili Powder in 1 and 3 ounce bottles may contain glass fragments, according to Dr. Roy O. Gilbert, Los Angeles county health officer.

Several days ago the Federal Food and Drug Administration, together with the Gebhardt Chili Powder Co., issued a warning to the public and to wholesale food distributors that glass fragments had been found in the chili powder and that its use could cause internal injuries.

Today's telegram from the State Health Department urged local departments to help in spreading the word for consumers to destroy any bottles in their possession or return them to the stores where they were purchased.
