Mother of Five Gives Tips On Cooking Peanut Brittle

Cooking and caring for five children and a husband can be a pretty busy job but it's also lots of fun, according to Mrs. A. W. Westerlin, 3420 W. 227th St.

In the morning she sends Dennis, 15, to South High; Don and Connie, 8, and Dan, 7, all to Meadow Park; and then tends to Sondra, two and a half months. In the meantime, Mr. Westerlin gets off to work as a field and service mechanic at Douglas, El Segundo.

The family has lived in Torrance for more than three years and both the Westerlins are active in PTA work. Mrs. Westerlin also is a member of the Westside Twin Mothers Club.

Her five children attest to her good cooking and one of their favorites is peanut brittle. Mrs. Westerlin shares her recipe with HERALD readers.

PEANUT BRITTLE

- 1 cup water
- 1 cup white syrup
- 3 cups white sugar
- 1 lb. raw peanuts
- 2 tsp. butter
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 tbs. soda

Place water, syrup and sugar in a three quart heavy sauce pan; boil slowly wiping down sides of pan with a covered fork until temperature reaches 270 degrees.

Add peanuts and boil to 300 degrees, stirring carefully to prevent burning as it caramelizes quickly.

Remove from fire and add butter, vanilla, soda and stirring just enough to fold in.

Pour in warm greased large cookie sheet, let cool without moving.

Serve when cold.
