

## Importance of Printing Topic For Kiwanians

Los Angeles' vast growth in size and importance is reflected in the growth of the printing industry in Southern California.

"The greater Los Angeles area is now the third largest printing center in the nation," said Scotty Matraw of Hillside Press speaking before a meeting of the Torrance Kiwanis Club at the American Legion Hall here Monday.

"The expansion of this field has provided opportunity for young people eager to pursue careers in the graphic arts," he said.

Matraw is one of more than 100 local graphic arts leaders who are addressing schools, business and civic clubs, and service organizations this month on behalf of International Printing Week which is being observed this week.

Printing Week is celebrated each January throughout the United States, and in Canada and Hawaii, coincident with the birthdate of Benjamin Franklin, the patron saint of printers.

"Printing is fifth in the nation in industrial importance," Matraw disclosed. "One out of

every 250 workers in America is employed in some phases of the graphic arts.

**Universal Use**  
"Since the invention of movable type by Johann Gutenberg in the 15th century, printing has given a lasting impression to all of man's thoughts, beliefs, and discoveries. It is the one medium of communication that enters every profession, every human endeavor."

Purpose of the annual Printing Week observance, according to Matraw, is to make the public aware of new advances in printing technology and to salute the spirit and enterprise of an industry which has been a constructive force in the cultural advancement of mankind.

Printing Week in Southern California is sponsored by the Printing Week Council of Greater Los Angeles, Inc., an organization composed of the Southland's major graphic arts associations.


## Woman Hurt

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## Emergency Care Test Scheduled By Defense Unit

A highly realistic exercise to test the capabilities of state, county, and local emergency and medical-health services to provide care for evacuees in reception areas will be through Jan. 22 by approximately 170 Southland civil defense organizations in 12 counties, Henry S. Eaton, coordinator, Region 1, California distaster office, announced.

The exercise, Eaton said, will be conducted under the direction of Robert A. Jakoubek, chief, CDO emergency welfare division, Sacramento; Dr. W. Dalton Davis, CDO medical and health consultant; William E. Matheus, emergency welfare, Region 1; and Dr. Frank F. Schade, chief, medical and health services, Region 1, CDO.

**Purpose Told**  
Purpose of the test is to determine just how many evacuees could be provided mass care and medical aid by reception area communities in event of an actual emergency, Eaton said. Only emergency welfare and medical and health services will be involved. Responsibility for the test will be on local civil defense directors aided by their chiefs of the two services. Control centers will not be activated, nor will radios or teletypes be used. No large groups of civil defense volunteers will take part in the test and there will be no public participation. However, local Red Cross disaster committees and volunteers, as well as school administrators, will play a prominent role in the exercise.

## Search for Queen

Search is getting under way in five Southern California counties for a queen to reign over the 1958 National Orange Show, world's largest citrus exposition, in San Bernardino, April 10 through April 20.

This year, for the first time, communities in the eastern portion of Los Angeles County have been invited to participate along with those in Riverside, San Diego, Orange, and San Bernardino counties.



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
