

Art Rental Exhibit Set For South Bay Courthouse

Paintings, sculpture and mosaics of nearly 90 South Bay artists, known and unknown, will be offered for rent at tiny fees at the Art Rental Exhibit Sunday, Feb. 23.

The time: 1 to 5 p.m., the place: South Bay Municipal Court Building, 1231 N. Pacific Ave., Redondo Beach.

Sponsored by the Art Rental Committee as a community service, the exhibit is intended to acquaint people of the South Bay area with the high caliber of art being created right in their own neighborhood. To foster the closer acquaintance of contemporary art and the public, works valued up \$500 are available to rent for two months at a fraction of their market value.

Enthusiastic public response is attested by the fact that this is the third such exhibit

within ten months. Sculpture and mosaics are a new feature of the Art Rental Exhibits. The previous events in May and October of 1957 featured only paintings.

The Art Rental Exhibits are the first of their kind in the South Bay area. The Art Rental Committee, organizers, is sponsored by the Manhattan Beach branch, American Association of University Women, and the South Bay Community Arts Assn.

It is not necessary to be a member of either organization in order to be represented in the exhibit, according to Mrs. Richard Coulston and Catherine Fels, chairman of the ARC.

Artists from each beach city, and Palos Verdes, Hollywood Riviera, and Torrance will be represented.

Third Muster Week Opened By Guard

The California National Guard will observe its third annual muster week, today through Feb. 23.

Capt. Douglas J. "Dutch" Horlander announced that the local unit will participate with displays, and open house at the Torrance Armory, and that their unit has been authorized to enlist 10 new recruits. The Torrance unit from its inception has conducted only selective recruiting, and is composed of the finest young men of Torrance and the surrounding areas.

Feb. 23rd will be the open house date for the Torrance Armory, and it has been revealed by Capt. Horlander that on that date at 1 p.m. that the local unit will receive the coveted award from the California Military Department, and regular army of the grade of "excellent" for the year of 1957. This is quite an accomplishment, and is based on the units training, and other accomplishments throughout the year.

Lt. Col. William L. Geissert, and Capt. Lane, regular army advisor will present the award to the Torrance unit on that date. This will be the first time any local unit has received such a high award.

Knight Endorses Plan Governor Goodwin J. Knight issued the following statement to Captain Horlander:

"In order to meet its fiscal year-end strength authorized by Congress, the California National Guard will participate in a statewide recruiting drive, Feb. 16 through Feb. 23, simultaneously with similar programs in our sister states. Particular emphasis this year will be placed on interesting those individuals with a reserve obligation to perform this service

with the National Guard. "Since colonial times this nation has depended upon the willingness of its civilian men instead of upon large standing armies to defend it in time of need. This tradition of civilian soldiery has been perpetuated in the National Guard—made up of men who volunteer their time and skills for the security of our state and nation.

"It is appropriate that the people of California support this effort to expand the ranks of its citizen soldiers. The members of the California National Guard have always been among the first to be called into service in time of national emergency."

Guardmen Called "We all know of the heroic peacetime service of our citizen soldiers. Within the past eight years thousands of California National Guardsmen were called upon three times to assist in protecting and rehabilitating vast areas of our state ravaged by raging flood waters. They responded, at great personal sacrifice, with characteristic alacrity and ability." Knight's message continued.

"In recognition of this loyal service, it is fitting that public attention and appreciation be focused on the California National Guard."

"With Muster Week being observed throughout California, I urge all young California men who face military service, and those who have a reserve obligation to give serious consideration to joining this distinguished branch of our armed forces. Our other citizens can be helpful by lending the fullest possible assistance to the California National Guard in meeting its recruiting goals."


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
