The most important phase of the situation is education, according to educators, enforcement officers, medical authorities and investigators.

Education is something in which each resident of Torrance can participate.

If the supply of narcotics can be shut off through education, the problem will be confined to the present addicts . . . a group which would get smaller each year as they are thrown in prison for crimes and as they are released from their self-made prisons by the only positive cure . . . death.

Education Sparse
Most educators, who are familiar with the narcotic problem, are of the opinion that education on the subject has been too sparse and too gentle.

The narcotic picture is not a nice one . . . the effects of the drug are far from nice . . . youngsters need to be told the full, horrible, and vulgar truth about these drugs.

Better they be told by their parents, than to experiment themselves.

While education should begin in the home, the school, police, and churches have an obligation too.

Elks Campaign
Here in Torrance, the Elks Lodge has undertaken an organized campaign to educate parents so that they can educate their children. The campaign has received the support of the city council, now it needs the support of the residents.

A problem of this magnitude can not be shrugged off lightly. An insidious core of addicts and pushers are already in operation in Torrance.

As parents, make sure you know where your children are and with whom they associate. Above all, give them security through a good home.

Further Information
Parents who wish further information may contact the Elks Lodge, the Torrance narcotic division, or the Narcotic Education Foundation of America, an organization formed to prevent addiction through education.

But can those who have already become addicts ever be "cured"? Is there any hope for these depraved individuals who must pillage and plunder to support their habit? These questions will be discussed in Thursday's article.

Since the division there have been several disputes between India and Pakistan, the most serious of which has been over Kashmir, a state lying between the two countries. India now controls Kashmir, although Chaudhry said that "if the people of Kashmir were allowed to vote, they would vote to join Pakistan." The matter has been taken to the United Nations.

Strides Made
His country has made great strides in the years since independence, he pointed out. More roads have been built in the last 10 years than in the previous 100 and illiteracy has been reduced from 95 per cent to 85 per cent in that short period. Education up to the secondary school level now is compulsory and free. Pakistan's jute production has increased eight-fold.

The American debate over which service should launch satellites is puzzling to many Pakistanis, who felt that the Russians had won a propaganda victory, he said.

War Not Expected
His countrymen do not expect another war soon, he said, "and we certainly do not want one."

The Little Rock crisis, he said, is regarded as "an unfortunate incident which can and does happen in many countries."

Arriving at the Torrance City Hall, Chaudhry ran into the mother of an American missionary to Pakistan with whom he was acquainted. Mrs. Gladys Stock, of the city finance department, was pleased to discover that Chaudhry knew her son, the Rev. Fred Stock, a United Presbyterian missionary.
