Carson Group Will Discuss Library Plan

John McDonnell will be guest speaker at the meeting of the Carson Civic Betterment Assn. next Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. at White Junior High School, 220th and Figueroa Sts., according to President Ray Wetzel.

The library committee of the association has met with William Geller and Mrs. Dorothy Jamison of the County Library staff, and discussed the problems of one or two branch libraries in the Carson district. There are now two small branch libraries serving Carson.

The County Library staff has proposed to build one library of about 3000 square feet and consolidate the two branches. Sites for the building have been proposed on Carson St. between Main and Figueroa, and on Main St. near 220th.

Members of the association will vote next Tuesday on their preference of one or two branch libraries. Contract for construction is expected to be let soon after a site has been selected.

PARK SITES STUDIED BY COMMITTEE

A committee of the Park and Recreation Commission will tour the city today to study possible sites for four parks called for by the City Council.

The study will be made in connection with the upcoming bond election, in which plans identical to that presented last October will be presented, except that a major park site in south Torrance was reduced in size and the council voted for three additional parks in various parts of the city.

The recreation committee, headed by Commissioner Ralph Morris, will make recommendations to the Park and Recreation Commission at a special meeting tomorrow on the sites of the three proposed parks. The commission will, in turn, make recommendations to the council Tuesday. Other members of the committee are Mrs. Naomi McVey and Lawrence Gitschier.

Although a 42-acre park was originally discussed in the Waveria Lake area, the commission will seek a 25-acre major park site for the south Torrance area.

Final rites were held yesterday in Stone and Myers Chapel with the Rev. John L. Taylor officiating. Burial was in Green Hills.


He was a native of Brooklyn, N. Y.
