KING GETS EDUCATION DOCTORATE

Louis J. King, 37, assistant supervisor of child welfare and attendance for the Los Angeles City Schools, has passed his final oral examinations for the doctor of education degree at the University of Southern California.

King received his AB from UCLA in 1943 and his master of social work degree from SC in 1951. His dissertation is on "Activity Group Therapy with Three Groups of Selected Elementary School Children."

Before being appointed to his present position in 1956, King taught for two years as a secondary teacher and counselor in the Torrance schools.

Prior to that he was a marriage counselor for the American Institute of Family Relations, a vocational counselor for the U. S. Veterans Administration, and a psychology instructor for the Los Angeles City Adult Schools.

CHP Paints Picture of Bad Driver

Of all drivers involved in traffic accidents in California, the greatest number are between the ages of 25 and 34, according to records kept by the California Highway Patrol. "Each year about one-fourth of all the drivers involved in traffic accidents in this state are between 25 and 34 years of age," declared Patrol Commissioner B. R. Caldwell. "The 15 to 24-year age group run a close second with just under 24 per cent of the total drivers involved."

"Approximately the same ratio holds true in analyzing the drivers in fatal accidents," Caldwell stated. "The 25 to 34-year age group made up 28 per cent of the total drivers involved in fatal accidents while the 15 to 24-year age group made up 24 per cent of the total involved."

Man Pictured
"A composite of the records indicates that a man between the ages of 25 and 34 driving too fast for conditions or violating a right-of-way is most

apt to become involved in a fatal or injury traffic accident between 4 and 5 p.m. on a city street," he continued. "The man will be driving a passenger car on a Saturday or Sunday in clear weather on dry pavement."

"He will have at least 11 years' driving experience and be driving in an area not con-

trolled by signs or signals," he said. "The only element in this picture actually creating the accident hazard is the violation of the traffic law; without it, he probably would not have been involved."
