### VETS MAY FILE FOR EXEMPTION

County Assessor Hazel Stowell, and Veterans Service Officer Sara R. Evans, announced jointly yesterday that veterans in this area may now file applications for annual tax exemptions in the assessor's office at the Torrance City Hall, 3301 Torrance Blvd.

The two officials pointed out that veterans often do not realize that requests for tax exemption of the first \$1000 of their property must be renewed each year. Counties throughout the state accept requests during a period running from the first Monday in March to the last Monday in May.

Eligibility is limited to veterans who do not own property worth \$5000 or more, based on assessed valuations. Veterans' widows, widowed mothers, or pensioned mothers and fathers of veterans also may qualify.

Certain paraplegic veterans who occupy "wheelchair" homes are entitled to \$5000 tax exemptions on those homes.

All property owned by the veteran must be considered in determining his eligibility for an exemption, including property outside the country of his residence.

California grants \$1000 tax exemptions to resident veterans of wars or campaigns, including women veterans.

### 8th Graders Write Story Of Torrance

An Ambitious group of eighth graders in Mrs. Irma Wilson's class at Riviera School has written a history of Torrance.

Since nobody ever has bothered to write a book about the city, the class decided to collect the facts, poring through old copies of the HERALD, interviewing residents, getting data from industrial firms and other agencies, and gathering records of the city's growth.

They have compiled this data into a mimeographed booklet containing the city's history, with miscellaneous facts about government, schools, industries, weather, and other facets of local life.

The youngsters also drew charts and maps illustrating various phases of city development.

Subjects covered include railroads, tides, shells, birds, airport operations, bus lines, winds, smog, rocks, water, telephones and other parts of the city. They have traced the city's development from a part of the early Spanish land grants to the city of 97,000 people today.
