A satellite will draw top interest among the displays, along with missile launchers, rocket motors, and a raft of other weapons and scientific developments.

To Greet Three New Industries

Official welcome to three new industries will highlight the monthly membership breakfast meeting of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce next Tuesday morning at the YWCA building, Carson and Plaza Del Amo.

Official "Keys to the City" will be presented to top officers of the Fulton Container Co., Inc., Independent Building Materials Co., and Arrow Brands, Inc., according to chairmen of the day Don Lasell and Sy Frank.

Each firm will present a brief outline of its operations and give details on employment and other facts.

Fulton Container Co. is building at 555 Maple Ave. and will manufacture multi-wall paper bags. J. B. Wesler is president of the firm, which will employ from 100 to 250 people.

Independent Building Materials Co. handles wholesale red wood building materials and is operating now at 525 Maple Ave. The firm employs between 50 and 100 persons, according to President W. E. Upton.

Arrow Brands, Inc. is a subsidiary of Reynolds Metals Co., and are converters of aluminum foil. Now under construction at 1900 S. Crenshaw Blvd., the plant will employ from 50 to 100 persons, according to President Harry W. Roth.

More than 50 firms will participate in displays and demonstrations. There will be 34 exhibits, 19 movies, and a number of other demonstrations.
