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Civic Leaders Head Campaign For Pitchess

Bob Higgins and Charles P. McCann, Torrance area civic leaders have appointed this city's co-chairmen of the Committee to Elect Pete Pitchess Sheriff, it was announced today by General Campaign Chairman T. R. Knudson.

Higgins and McCann said they accepted the co-chairmanship because of Undersheriff Pitchess' outstanding record as a law enforcement officer.

"Pete Pitchess' 12 years as an FBI agent and his five years as undersheriff make him the logical man to succeed retiring Sheriff Eugene Biscailuz," Higgins said.

McCann said the sheriff of the nation's largest sheriff's department "must be a capable administrator.

"Undersheriff Pitchess has proven his ability as the second-highest ranking officer in the department," McCann added.

Higgins and McCann said organizing a committee to work for the election of Pitchess.

County Funds Requested by Lomita Group

The Lomita Chamber of Commerce has asked the County Board of Supervisors to give it the same ratio of funds which it gives to the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce.
