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Best Food Buys of Week Surveyed for Homemakers

To stretch the family budget for food and to assist local housewives in providing nutritious and well balanced meals for their families, the survey of local markets this week gives the following as the "best buys":

- FRESH FROM THE FIELDS AND TREES**
- ARTICHOKES** moderate in supply. Usual seasonal decline making itself evident.
 - ASPARAGUS.** Plenty of it, although the processors are stepping into the picture.
 - BEANS.** Green, snap, making their first appearance from the earliest Coachella Valley fields. Will increase rapidly during next several weeks.
 - BELL PEPPERS.** Medium, best buys.
 - CORN.** A fresh, new treat. First shipments of corn from Coachella Valley arriving, although it will be 3 or 4 weeks before real volume starts rolling.
 - POTATOES.** Kern County harvested first of this year's crop. Quality is high — but tends toward smaller sizes.
 - SQUASH.** Italian and summer.
 - TOMATOES.** Small sizes; improved in quality.
 - APPLES — GRAPEFRUIT STRAWBERRIES**
 - AVOCADOS** plentiful. Many markets will "special" this delicious fruit.
 - CANTALOUPE.** Imperial Valley brush covered plantings still limited in production. They will remain high for at least a month.
 - EGGS.** Large and small down 1 cent; mediums down 2 cents — mediums are best buys.
 - PROTEIN FOODS**
- If you are serious about controlling costs you'll find ways of using the variety meats. These are relatively inexpensive and highly nutritious. A few most popular:
- Liver, heart, sweetbreads,

- brains, tongue, tripe, kidney, and oxtails.
 - LAMB.** It has been a long time since lamb has been so plentiful or reasonable in price. Grazing conditions have been excellent all winter. The recent warm weather and north winds are drying the grazing ranches forcing the lamb to go to market immediately. Eastern markets which normally take more than 50 per cent of the California springers have been supplied by abnormal numbers of 1957 feeder lambs which went into the wheat belt and corn states last fall. Take advantage of this plentiful, delectable meat. This is the time to get a pleasant menu change:
 - Lamb Kabobs:** Cut shoulder into 1-inch cubes; marinate in French dressing; string on skewers. Broil 3 inches from heat about 15 minutes.
 - BEEF.** Barbecue fans will find a few "specials" on hind quarter cuts.
 - HAM.** Fully cooked — more in line in price with all meats, except lamb, which is more reasonable.
 - VEAL** chops, steaks, and round bone roasts more abundant.
 - DOGGER FANS**
