Let's talk about "casserole cuts." The wise homemaker is the one who feeds her family well—with a minimum of effort and cost. "Casserole cuts" fill the bill, and are always available.

"Casserole cuts" are meats which are prepared in moist heat. They may be prepared, or partially prepared, in advance. They're the foods which so often are even better as "encores." This feature makes them so practical for the working mother. She can prepare the meat the evening before, or in the cool of the morning, and complete it for dinner. The working girl has no corner on these easy-does-it meals. Full-time homemakers should take advantage of them.

The tender-cooked meat is removed from the bone, and combined with any number of possibilities: vegetables, rice, noodles, or dotted with feather-light dumplings. Use your ingenuity.

YWCA Camp Jr. Officers Registration Under Way

Registration has begun for the YWCA owned and operated Camp Tahquitz Meadows which will open July 1 and close Aug. 28," according to Mrs. Larry Lightner, chairman of the Harbor Area YWCA Camp Committee. Mrs. Lightner emphasizes the fact that as soon as registrations open the camp fills up rapidly so that girls planning on attending should reserve a place immediately.

"This year again with the help of the community groups that recognize the value of a camping experience for girls, the YWCA will be able to make some camperships or part camperships available to needy girls," Mrs. Lightner stated.

The camp is located 19 miles east of Hemet on Highway 74, one mile past Mt. Center. Swimming, hiking, horseback riding, archery, volley-ball, baseball and crafts are a part of the program. A major emphasis at camp is swimming as the regulation Olympic pool dedicated two years ago serves as an incentive for aquatic activities. Two trained swimming counselors assist the girls in earning the Red Cross Certificates as a part of the swimming program.

The YWCA camping program is geared to meet the needs of the adolescent girl so it is open to those who will be in the seventh grade in the fall and those of high school age.

A fraternal breakfast will be served next Sunday morning at the Masonic Temple from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m.

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
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PTA ACTIVITIES
