

Mary Sippel Wins Award In State-Wide Essay Contest

Miss Mary Sippel, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. H. M. Sippel, 2914 Onrado Ave., was the Torrance High senior winning the outstanding student award in the program sponsored state-wide by the California Savings and Loan League, and locally by the Southwest Marine Savings and Loan.

The state-wide \$40,000 student award program was initiated this year and gives recognition to outstanding seniors in 300 California public high schools.

Miss Sippel participated in an essay contest. The five winners will share an additional \$5000 scholarship and the five schools represented will each receive a trophy bearing the name of the winner.

She is a life member of the Scholarship Society, member of the Senior Council, a four-year member of the Tartar Band. In 1957 she represented Torrance High School as the exchange student of American Field Service, spending the summer in Finland.

Her father is pastor of the First Christian Church. She has been active in church work serving as president of the Harbor-Bay Area of Christian Youth Fellowship. Miss Sippel is in the youth choir at the First Christian Church.

The award, along with a bronze engraved plaque, will be presented at an awards assembly at Torrance High School on Tuesday, June 10.
