DAIRY PRODUCTS. June is dairy month. Markets and dairies will have interesting special items.

AT THE MEAT COUNTER. Lamb and Poultry are still the budget items. There is beef and pork for those who need to include it for menu changes. Smoked and cured pork products probably offer best values in comparison to prices for fresh.
