#### STRAWBERRY OMELETTE

1 lb. fresh strawberries 1/2 tsp. lemon juice  
Enough sugar to sweeten 1/2 c. sherry wine or  
Pinch of salt cranberry juice  
1 tbsp. flour 1 1/2 tbsp. honey  
Heat strawberries, salt, sugar, flour, lemon juice, and sherry. Simmer slowly, about 15 min. Just before removing from heat add honey. Stir and spread on already-prepared omelette. Fold omelette and return to heat, then serve topped with more strawberry sauce.  
For a Sunday supper Mrs. Boylan suggests this omelette served with a gelatin salad, tiny crackers, and iced tea.
