BEST BUYS FOR THE WEEK

In Torrance Markets

A glance at the produce stands proves that summer is here. Deciduous fruits, berries, and melons are moving in fast—and prices are dropping.

Even though the crop is smaller than last year's, peach growers report that we'll have no worries. They'll keep up amply supplied with fresh peaches all season. Yellow meat varieties are already here—you find them generally distributed in almost all markets. It is a little early to can or freeze peaches. Red Havens and July Elbertas will come along in a few weeks. The growers recommend the Red Haven as an early all-purpose fruit. It is fine for freezing—it is firm and resistant to darkening.

Cherry growers in Beaumont and Cherry Valley invite you to pick your own cherries in their orchards. Picking buckets and ladders are furnished—but take your own boxes to tote your fruit home.

Prices are quoted as "near wholesale." The home canning trade is encouraged, so a minimum of 25 pounds per family is required. Smaller quantities may be purchased already picked.

Picnic facilities are available. We now have APRICOTS, CANTALOUPS, CRANSHAW, HONEYDEWS, PERSIANS, and WATERMELONS, CHERRIES, GRAPES, PEACHES, PLUMS, NECTARINES, and a wide selection of berries—STRAW-

BERRIES, BOYSENBERRIES, OLALLIES, RASPBERRIES and BLUEBERRIES.

Meat prices, in general, show no tendency to decline, but in honor of Father's Day you can look for some price concessions. Father may enjoy a beef roast or steak—there'll be some "specials." Many market men believe that lamb still offers the best regular values.

Again, poultry is the best buy. The frequency of acceptance is so much higher than it once was because of the versatility of the fowl—it is so much better prepared, and the "built-in" convenience that it now offers gives the housewife a little more of that much needed "time" for other things. Turkeys are available in plentiful quantities at reasonable prices and will be featured in many markets.

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
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
