Scallopini, Strawberry Pie Favorites with Robinsons

SCALLOPINI

3 veal shoulder steaks
3 tbsp. olive oil
1/2 c flour
2 garlic cloves
2 tsp. parsley (chopped)

1 lg. can whole tomatoes drained
1 can mushrooms
salt, pepper, thyme, sweet basil, marjoram

Heat oil in skillet and cook crushed garlic. Add meat, cook gently until golden brown. Drain mushrooms, add to meat. Cover and cook about 5 min. Add tomatoes, mushroom liquor, parsley and spices. Simmer gently until meat is tender. Serve with rice, bread sticks, antipasto.

STRAWBERRY PIE

Line a baked pie shell with fresh strawberries. Then mix 1 cup crushed strawberries, 1 cup sugar, 1 tsp. corn starch dissolved in a little cold water. Boil until transparent. Pour hot berry syrup over fresh berries in pie shell. Chill, serve with whipped cream.
