

Two Named To World Y Council

Word has been received that two of the six visiting delegates from the Western Region to the World Council of the YWCA at Cuernavaca, Mexico in September, will be from the Harbor Area YWCA. They are Dr. Frances Clark, first vice-president and area membership chairman and Jeanette Patchin, director of the San Pedro Branch, who has served in the Foreign Division of the Assn.

"This meeting of the World Council will mark the first time in 65 years of its existence that it has met in a Latin American country. To this little town of Cuernavaca will come representatives of National Associations from 60 countries. In principle each affiliated National Association may send from two up to a maximum of twelve delegates depending on the size of the membership. In addition, national presidents and general secretaries are Council members ex-officio. This would mean that about 200 delegates may attend the World Council meeting. The Council is the body invested with the legislative powers of the World Association, determining policy and program and transacting its legal and financial business. It also considers and evaluates the Association's activities during the four-year period between Council meetings. It is the responsibility of this body every four years to look ahead, and trying to see the special place of the YWCA as a Christian movement in our troubled world," Miss Patchin stated.
