1. Lie flat on the floor with your hands behind your neck; ask someone to hold your feet, and then roll up into a sitting position.
2. Repeat test one, but with your knees bent and your feet on the floor as close as you can comfortably put them to your body.
3. Lie flat, as in test number one, and raise your legs to a thirty-degree angle, holding them straight out for ten seconds.
4. Lie on your stomach, put a thick pillow under your hips, clasp your hands, and while someone holds your feet, raise your head and chest just off the floor for ten seconds.
5. From the same position, have someone hold your chest down, and raise your legs off the floor for ten seconds.
6. Bend over and, without bouncing up and down, touch the floor with your fingertips, and hold for three seconds.
