

Bowling Alley Slated for New Del Amo Center

Plans have been announced for the Del Amo Lanes, a lush bowling facility to be located at the Del Amo Shopping Center in Torrance.

Del Amo Lanes, 40-lane establishment to be built by Clifford S. Heinz, Jr. Enterprises, current operators of the Orange Bowl in the San Bernardino-Rialto area, are expected to be completed by December 15.

A spokesman for Coldwell, Banker & Company, Del Amo agents, explained the bowling facility will operate on a lease contract, 24 hour operation being directed by Lattimer Dills, an associate of Heinz Enterprises.

SPECTACULAR design of the entrance was accomplished by the architectural firm of Anthony & Langford, A.I.A., through the use of pre-cast concrete barrel-vaults. The single story structure will incorporate a coffee shop seating 100 persons as well as dining room and banquet facilities for 340 persons. Hosting dining guests will be Stephan Hotz, presently associated with the Brass Rail in New York City.

Mr. Heinz, grandson of H.J. Heinz, founder of the huge food products company, noted that every modern convenience is being planned to enable families to participate as a group. A play area for the children is anticipated as an addition convenience.

All forty lanes will be serviced by A.M.F.'s newest automatic pinsetting equipment, one of the first installations in Southern California.

Coaches Jack Kramer and Bob Shoup will place on display Saturday evening what is said to be the best crop of college football prospects in Bay or Pioneer League history when the Bay League all-stars run up against the Pioneer stars in the fourth annual Optimist football game. Game time is 8:30 at El Camino's Murdock Stadium.

The Pioneer League is a one touchdown favorite to beat the Bay Loop cast for the third straight year.

North High's Bob Shoup, in charge of the Pioneer League, claims to have assembled one of the best backfields in any all-star game while Bay League mentor Kramer of Santa Monica lays claim to an equally strong line.

FORFEITS continued to mar the Torrance Recreation Department Summer softball leagues this week. A total of four forfeits were registered. Two Friday games gave wins to the Fire Department "A" team and Inglewood Farms when the North Torrance Lions Club and the Porcs nine failed to show for the games. Monday night the Aeros came up short on men and forfeited to the Lovelady Hardwood nine, while the Marine Clerks won by default over Vickers.

Most of the action was close and there were a couple of upsets in the course of the week. R. C. Dyer turned the tables on the favored Redondo Latter Day Saints and defeated them 2-1 behind the three hit pitching of Don Riedel.

THE PIONEER Loop backfield, headed by signal caller Larry Balliet of Morningside consists of all CIF (Southern Section) back Ken del Conte (Morningside), Carl Moore of El Segundo and El Segundo's LeRoy Golding with all CIF back Ernie Thomsen to spare. Countering for the Bay League will be linemen Mike Conrad and Dave Stout of Mira Costa along with Bill Eagen and Mike Crowder.

But neither team is very poor when speaking of the Pioneer League line or the Bay backfield. Quarterbacking the Bay League from Kramer's flanker T is Torrance graduate Ron Verves with Austin Dias also expected to see action. Also in the Bay Loop backfield are a couple of halfbacks, Jack Edwards and Rudy Cavajal. Kramer believes that the success of the Bay League attack will depend on how well these boys hold up in the contest.

Working on the line for the Pioneer all-stars is North High grad Eddie Jaurequi, rated as the top Pioneer League defensive man. Gary Lofgren, Dick Bybee and Norm Smotony add depth to the Pioneer Loop line.

BOTH BALLETT and Verves take to the air lanes quite often. The Pioneer League boasts Jim Johnson of Morningside and Jim Myers at the end positions while the Bay League will use Jeff Fredrickson and Tim Smith.

During the past week of practice both coaches have been firing remarks at each other's chances in the Saturday night summer classic. Kramer has said that the Pioneer League doesn't have a chance to score his Bay line and Shoup counters with a casual claim to a backfield that would match any all-star backfield.

THE RESERVE strength of the Pioneer League lies in fullback Ernie Thomsen who has been sidelined offensively for LeRoy Golding, the Pioneer League dark horse, and in quarterback Bill Hall. Hall demonstrates remarkable capability as a running quarterback and can hit the mark on pass patterns.

Ron Verves' understudy for the signal calling position on the Bay squad is Austin Dias, also capable of top notch passing.

The summer spectacular will benefit the Optimist Home for Boys in Los Angeles. Tickets are now on sale and may be purchased at the gate. 1. Lie flat on the floor with your hands behind your neck; ask someone to hold your feet, and then roll up into a sitting position.
