
The 17-year-old soldier is a 1959 graduate of San Fernando High School. His father, Alexander Denecochea, lives at Hotel Torrance, Torrance.

Shortly after the steel strike began, we published a statement in this newspaper. It was headed "Steel Union on Strike for More Inflation."

We told you about the highly inflationary demands of the Steelworkers Union. We told about our unsuccessful efforts to avert a strike, and the various offers and proposals we made during the course of negotiations.
