ESTABLISHED in 1889 as the Home Investment Building and Loan Association, Home opened its first office in a private home near the intersection of Fourth and Hill in downtown Los Angeles.

Urge College Bound Vets to Apply at Once

Veterans of the Korean Conflict who plan to apply for educational assistance this fall from the Veterans Administration, or under the state "Cal-Vet" school aid program if they have used up their federal rights, should make application as soon as possible.

This was the advice of Veterans Service Officer Bessie D. Sioneker today, who said that by applying now, veterans will make it easier for her office, at 1622 Gramercy, and those of the VA and Department of Veterans Affairs in handling satisfactorily the thousands of applications expected by the opening of the fall term.

Veterans should make arrangements themselves for entering the school or college of their choice before applying for GI assistance, and applications must be accompanied by a photostat or certified copy of discharge or separation paper.

A recent act of the California Legislature makes it possible for veterans to enroll for certain graduate or professional college courses at approved institutions outside the United States.

However, those who can receive duplicate benefits from any other government source, such as the federal War Orphans Educational Assistance program, will no longer be eligible for state assistance.

Torrance Herald—313 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE ADDING ARTICLE IV TO CHAPTER 22 OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE, 1954, ESTABLISHING A POLICE RESERVE CORPS IN AND FOR SAID CITY, AND PROVIDING FOR THE FUNCTIONING OF SAID CORPS AND OF THE MEMBERS THEREOF.

The City Council of the City of Torrance does ordain as follows: SECTION 1. That Article IV entitled "Police Reserve Corps" is hereby added to Chapter 22 of "The Code of the City of Torrance, 1954," to read in its entirety as follows:

Section 22.40. Established, composition and compensation. There is hereby established in and for the City of Torrance, California, a Police Reserve Corps. Said corps is so established as a voluntary organization composed of persons to be appointed by the chief of police of said city (hereinafter referred to as the chief). Each and all of said persons so appointed and composing said corps shall serve gratuitously. The membership of said corps shall not exceed fifty. The chief shall have complete authority and control over said corps. Said chief may appoint as members of said corps any persons whom he deems to be qualified and he may reject any application for membership.

Section 22.41. Function of the corps. The said corps shall function as a unit of the police department in the program and activities of the civil defense and disaster commission of the city and shall also function to assist regular police officers of said city in law enforcement and the maintenance of peace and order in all cases where, in the opinion of the said chief, it is impracticable to furnish adequate police protection solely by means of regular police officers of said city.

Section 22.42. Training and assignment. The chief shall provide for the training of candidates for membership in said corps and for the further training of members of said corps in all fields of police activity, and for that purpose may assign such members to any of the various police duties of the police department of said city.

Section 22.43. Membership. Membership in said police reserve corps shall be open to both men and women, and whenever the male sex is referred to in this article it shall be construed to include both male and female.

Section 22.44. Qualification. No person shall become a member of the corps hereby established until he has taken the training and is able to meet all other requirements prescribed by the chief for such membership. When so qualified, and when selected by said chief, such member shall then be sworn in by the chief, or his duly authorized representative, as a member of the corps and shall take and file with the city clerk the required loyalty oath.

Section 22.45. Rules and regulations. In order to effectuate the purpose of said corps, the chief may by order establish rules and regulations to govern the corps, including the fixing of specific duties of its members and providing for the maintenance of discipline. He may change such orders from time to time.

Section 22.46. Termination and resignation from membership. The membership of any person in said corps may be terminated by the chief at any time, and any member of said corps may resign from the corps at any time upon notifying the chief of police in writing of his resignation.

Section 22.47. Issuance of identification. When a selected and designated person has been duly sworn in and has subscribed and filed the required loyalty oath, an identification card, badge and cap piece, and such other insignia or evidence of identification, as said chief may prescribe, shall be issued to such person who shall thereupon be a member of said corps.

Section 22.48. Carrying arms. No member of said corps shall carry any firearm until he has been qualified for and received a gun permit signed by said chief. All members of the corps when on duty shall carry the regulation police baton unless otherwise instructed by the said chief.

Section 22.49. Authority. A member of the corps when on duty as designated by the chief, or his duly authorized representative, shall have the authority, with the provisions of the ordinances of said city and the laws of the State of California, and shall have the same general power of arrest as any regular member of the police department, subject, however, to any limitation which said chief, or his duly authorized representative, may impose.

Section 22.50. Increasing or decreasing membership. Subject to the provisions of section 22.40 of this Code, the chief may by order diminish or expand the membership of the corps at any time as in his discretion may be required.

Section 22.51. Uniform, sidarms, belt, holster, etc. (a) The uniform for members of the corps shall be similar to the uniform worn by members of the regular police department, but with an identifying insignia to be prescribed by the chief. Sidarms carried by members are to be carried in the regulation police Sam Browne belt and holster, as approved by the chief. Insignia and badge shall be furnished by the city and shall be and remain the property of the city.

(b) The uniform, badge, cap piece, insignia (other than identification card), gun, belt, holster and baton shall be carried only while the member carrying same is on duty as assigned by the chief. Section 22.52. Corps not under civil service or state employees' retirement act. The members of said corps, as such, shall not be in or under the civil service system of said city, nor as such member of said corps shall they be in or under the State Employees' Retirement Act or system membership of said city; but each and all of the members of said corps, as such members, shall be entitled to receive full protection and benefits provided for disaster service workers and civilian defense workers, all as contemplated and set forth in and under the provisions of the Labor Code of the State of California relating to disaster service workers and civilian defense workers.

Public Notice

Section 22.53. Misrepresentation unlawful. It shall be unlawful for any person (other than a regular police officer of said city) who is not a member of said corps: (a) To wear, carry or display any identification card, badge, cap piece, uniform or insignia of said corps; or (b) In any manner to represent himself to be connected with said corps.

SECTION 2. Any provision of the Torrance City Code, or appendix thereto, inconsistent herewith, to the extent such inconsistencies and no further, are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be subject to a fine not exceeding Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00), or six (6) months in the County Jail of Los Angeles County, or by both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the Court.

SECTION 4. This Ordinance shall take effect thirty days after the date of its adoption and prior to the expiration of fifteen (15) days after the passage thereof shall be published at least once in the Torrance Herald, a semi-weekly newspaper of general circulation, published and circulated in the City of Torrance.
