## Two Playoffs Scheduled as City Softball Action Closes

Two playoffs in the Torrance city softball leagues will be scheduled for early next week to decide titles in the Black and Service slo-pitch leagues. The Torrance Kiwanis and the Optimist will play on Tuesday or Wednesday for the Service League crown, while the Local 1135, by virtue of a win over Al's Knolls Drugs Friday, will meet the Fire Department A nine for the Black league title.

Recapping the action during the final week of play, the Fire Department B nine were nosed out of first place in the Blue League when the Torrance Elks defeated them Friday evening, 9-8. Winner was Jim Williams while the loss was charged to Bob Moffitt in relief. Harlan Whiteacre and Jim Charles homered for the losers.

Other Blue League games found the Kenny's Shoe Repair nine defeating the Redondo Postmen, 6-5, while Inglewood Farms won by forfeit over the Porks.

IN THE RED League, the Tappa Keggas defeated the Water Department by a score of 12-8. The win was credited to Chuck Ryan while the loss went to Ben Kidner. Glen Mitchel hit a homer for the losers. The JFF shutout the Rome Cable Company, 9-0 in the only other Red League game scheduled. The game was not for the standing, however.

An exhibition game between the Inglewood Telephone team and the League champion Post Office nine was the only Industrial League action. The Inglewood nine won it, 9-1. Four errors on the Postmen made the difference in the final outcome.

With all this talent and featuring the National League top two teams, this year's Kiwanis game should be the greatest in its history. Small pointed out,


